## WHO ARE WILDLIFE REHABILITATORS?

They wear many hats. They are a nurse, a caregiver, a janitor, a teacher and much more! They are **NOT** paid. Everything they do is at their own expense. Their oath is to help wildlife that has been injured, orphaned or sick due to storms, cycle of life or humans. We never treat them as pets. Our ultimate goal is to return them back to the wild. If they are so severely inured that we cannot return them to the wild we humanely euthanize. If they recover from their injuries but cannot be returned to the wild but can have a good life as an ambassador for their kind in an educational facility they will be transferred to one.

Our goal as rehabilitators is to provide professional care to sick, injured or orphaned wildlife so they can ultimately be returned to their natural habitat.

Wildlife Rehabilitators work very closely with Veterinarians to assess injuries and diagnose a variety of illnesses. They must be able to administer basic first aid and physical therapy. They need extensive knowledge of each and every species that they rehabilitate because each animal has a different diet, cage & rehab requirements.

The federal government under the Migratory Bird Act protects almost all

birds. It requires a Federal permit & a state permit to work with birds. To work with mammals, reptiles and amphibians it requires a State Rehabilitators
License. Once they get their appropriate permits they are required to do continuous education by attending conferences, seminars and workshops, by keeping up with published literature and networking with others in their field.

Because of their training a Wildlife Rehabilitator can help the public decide if an animal needs to come into care. They educate people on how to live with wildlife.

People may be attracted to wildlife rehabilitation because it sounds rewarding, exciting and fun!! It can be all that and more. But the reality is that it can also be difficult, stressful, tiring and frustrating. It is not easy and it is not a hobby!! It takes commitment, time, energy and the willingness to provide the highest quality of care needed. Wildlife Rehabilitation also takes money---the government DOES NOT pay you!!! It is not about "cuddling of animals" or "making them pets". It's about releasing those who recover back into the wild. It's about recognizing that some will die and some you will have to be euthanized. But overall, the joy and pride that overwhelms you when you release one back into the wild makes it all worthwhile.

### How to help your local rehabbers:

Call them and ask what things they need. Give them a gift certificate to a place where they get supplies.

#### Two most common believes:

### I cannot return baby birds to their nest.

False, as long as the bird is warm and uninjured you can. Birds have the worst sense of smell.

### Raccoons have rabies if they are out during daylight.

Not necessarily, they could be looking for food for themselves and/or their babies, looking for a place to live or sleep.

#### **HOW TO FIND A REHABILITATOR**

In any State, you can call your local Game & Inland Fisheries, local Veterinarian, or animal shelter and they should have some phone numbers of some local wildlife rehabilitators.

#### **How to Report a Violation**

If you found an animal that was shot or deliberately injured by humans call 1-800-237-5712 or email WildCrime@dgif.virginia.gov.

When Reporting try to provide as much information as possible, such as:

- What happened
- Where it happened, being specific as possible
- Who was involved, describing persons (names if known), vehicles (license numbers are crucial), names of other witnesses
- When did it happen (date and time are very important!)

IF THIS IS AN EMERGENCY SITUATION, contact the local Game Warden immediately through the local sheriff's office or police department. Don't allow the actions of a few outlaws tarnish everyone else's reputation.

#### "KOLA WAKON OF WILDLIFE"

Roughly translated it means "Sacred Friend of Wildlife". This is what every Wildlife Rehabilitator, every person who rescues wildlife, everyone who transports and every Veterinarian that works with wildlife are to the wild kingdom.
